Notes for the Season

The post-Christmas season - called *Epiphany* (Greek: Revelation) - is a season of afterthought. During this season we meditate upon the implications of what we have celebrated: the Son of God becoming Man. The theme of the season is how our Lord Jesus reveals who He is and what He has come to do. For this is the point of His miraculous works; to demonstrate His power as the power of deliverance and salvation. The colour of the season is **green**, signifying **growth and ripening**.

About Holy Communion

Holy Scripture teaches that to honour Christ's call for unity in His Church, Christians must share the Sacrament only with those with whom we are united in a common faith. We should fear and love God, so that we do not despise preaching and His Word, but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it.

Of the Small Catechism

A Life Thought from Lutherans for Life: Life issues like surprise pregnancy and terminal diagnosis come with uncertainty. But the Lord our God knows both our worries (Psalm 139:4) and the best way forward. He has already seen (John 1:48) what it will take to save, and He has still chosen life for all humankind, even when we behold only darkness and despair. We may not know what tomorrow holds, but we know who holds tomorrow.

Do not be miserable without letting your Pastor know about it. Not that your Pastor likes to learn that you are miserable; but if you are, he would like to know. Your Pastor might not know about the things that are happening in your life; or he might know of what is happening, but not be aware of how it is bothering you, or how much. He should be, though: part of what he is there for is to help you through difficult times, and allowing him to do so is part of what it means to have a Pastor and be Church, and Christian. Even if what is bothering is not what you yourself would think of as a spiritual or church related issue, you should nevertheless not exclude the possibility that having the light of the Word of God shed upon it might be helpful. In fact, refusing the spiritual guidance God provides for you, and to which He directs you in Holy Scripture, and go your own way instead, that is not only disobedience against God, it also comes with the risk of going astray and suffering shipwreck to your faith. So please, if there are things that are bothering you in your life, let your Pastor know about it.
